A message from Pat McKee, Chair, Oomama

The Grandmothers to Grandmothers Campaign recently celebrated its 15th year anniversary with an amazing online event that can be viewed at:

I am now into the third year of my two-year term as chair. What was once a co-chair position has become a single chair position with no obvious successor in the wings. But I am not complaining or looking for gratitude. Quite the contrary, it is my pleasure to express sincere appreciation to all the awesome Oomamas.

The Fundraising Team, with the support of a well-developed online marketplace, developed largely by Beverly Carr, has been busy creating and selling sewn items – mostly masks and produce bags – as well as beeswax bowl covers. Leslie K – the self-named "Crafty Bitch" has ably led the group of scintillating sewers (not the kind that are underground), resulting in impressive fundraising results. Leslie's mask designs have evolved since March 2020 and now include adjustable ear cords, flexible nose wires and a pocket to insert a filter cloth. And note the "Vaccinated" mask on page 3.

The annual Stride to Turn the Tide was an amazing success, resulting in more than \$16,000 raised by the joint efforts of Oomama and the Bronte Grans. The first-place fundraiser was Anne MacKenzie-Thompson. Over the 4 months while we strode, Anne and Tina wrote poems and provided insights into the geography, history and SLF involvement along our virtual Stride route through sub-Saharan Africa.

In mid-October, we celebrated our Virtual Stride with an inperson picnic in Lakeside Park, Mississauga. Anne put her her talents to work, composing lyrics to the tune of the Happy Wanderer, which we sang together.

Leslie Kulokas, who tracked all the kilometres and steps of our 26 striders, reported that we covered 19,089 kilometres from Botswana to Uganda and part way back again to Botswana. She announced that Peggy Brightwell (photo on right), who had covered the most kilometres, had won a bottle of wine in a lovely Stride wine bag. Unfortunately, Peggy was ill that day and unable to attend the party.

Wendy Merson, who was responsible for signing striders who were fundraising onto the Stride website, congratulated the 20 fundraisers for realizing \$16,175 for SLF. She presented a bottle of wine to Anne MacKenzie-Thompson, the top fundraiser at \$4000. (See Anne singing on page 1)



Wendy also thanked Geraldine Bernard, who is not a member of a grandmother group, for raising \$1370 on the Halton/Peel Stride team. Geraldine was invited to become a Super Friend of Oomama. 

A "Stride to Turn the Tide" Scarf Journey "WHAT GOES AROUND COMES AROUND"







The Journey Begins:

CANADA: An idea takes shape to design a brightly coloured African scarf to be worn as an emblem of solidarity with African Grandmothers on a nationwide **Stride to Turn the Tide** Walk. The design is inspired by a painted stone garden created by the self-taught "Outsider" artist, Nukain Mubusa, and by illustrations of South African tribes and culture created by artist Barbara Tyrell.

SOUTH AFRICA: An expanded order of 5000 scarves was sent from Canada to South Africa in 2011. The order was distributed among a number of South African women's sewing groups. The goal of these "upliftment" groups is to create income for women in poverty-stricken areas. Dozens of women and their families benefited from this scarf project.

CANADA: The finished scarves are sent to Canada and distributed throughout the country. What started off as a grassroots initiative by Pam Farron and the Mountain Grannies became a nation-wide call to all Grandmothers' groups involved in the *Stephen Lewis Foundation's* Grandmothers to Grandmothers Campaign to walk in support of the" unsung heroes" of Africa, African Grandmothers
